Given the additional challenges they face, Special Population students may struggle even more than their peers to develop hope. Hope is particularly important because it is a leading character strength, and supports other SEL aptitudes such as resilience, agency, enthusiasm, and growth mindset, as well as active pursuit of career pathways that help prepare for future success. This session will build on themes covered in JPAC's 2017 session "Cultivating Character and Purpose" as well as yesterday's Part 1 workshop, "Equity and Reality" (which is not a prerequisite for attending this workshop.) We will be diving more deeply into understanding the varieties of trauma – including the situational trauma of prejudice and discrimination. We also will discuss the hope construct, which provides direction regarding what kind of educational practices are critically important as well as synergistic.
